You're probably familiar with the quote by Margaret Mead that states, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful people can change the world. Indeed, it's the only thing that ever has."

Sounds like a nice bumper sticker, but in the real world it looks a lot like the small animal room at Greenhill. What I mean by that is that Greenhill's small animal program for rabbits, guinea pigs, rats, hamsters and gerbils is concrete evidence of the power of a few people with passion and commitment to accomplish miracles. Today, Greenhill's small animal program rivals any in the state for quality of care for animals and education for adopters, but just six years ago it was not a pretty sight. Housing for bunnies and other small critters was marginal at best and knowledge about proper nutrition and care was slim.

Then someone decided to be creative. A veterinarian on Greenhill's board of directors knew a woman named Barbara Ray who was very knowledgeable about rabbit care. Barbara was invited to see what suggestions she could make to improve the situation for Greenhill's small animals - only she had to do it without any dedicated staff or funds to speak of!

Nearly six years later, the story of how Barbara took the challenge and ran with it was the subject of a full length article in "Animal Sheltering", a publication of the Humane Society of the United States. In the magazine's Volunteering 101 section, the story of Greenhill's rabbit/small animal program was profiled and held up as an example of what can be done when one focused and patient volunteer has a vision and an organization is willing to listen.

Thank you to Barbara and all the many unheralded volunteers who are the lifeblood of every not-for-profit organization. You're undoubtedly not thanked as often as you should be, but you are ALWAYS appreciated!

## Oregon Lawmakers Pass Animal Disaster Bill

In August of 2005, when Hurricane Katrina forced the evacuation of New Orleans, hundreds of thousands of pet owners faced a choice no one could have predicted. Leave: getting themselves and their families to safety, but leaving their pets behind to fend for themselves. Or Stay: putting their own lives in danger to avoid abandoning their animals.

More than 50,000 dogs and cats were left behind in the city. Pet owners had to evacuate from their jobs, and had no way of returning home to rescue their pets, many of whom were left locked in houses, crated, or chained in yards. Families said tearful goodbyes to their animal companions and released them, hoping to give them the best chance of survival. Many pets died. The animals that survived the storm, and the flooding after the levee broke, were forced to endure more than 6 weeks without food or fresh water before rescuers could reach them. Most had to tread water for hours, sometimes days, looking for a safe place to climb out of the toxic water. They were left dehydrated, hungry, with skin rotting from contact with raw sewage. And they had no one to look to for guidance or protection. In the weeks after the storm, many roamed the streets in packs, relying on instinct to keep them alive. Of those that were rescued, few were ever reunited with the families forced to leave them behind.

Then, there were the families that refused to leave. When evacuation orders came, many people refused to board boats that would take them to safety because their animal companions could not come along. They spent days stranded on roofs, huddled together with the dogs and cats that were their families – waiting. They shared what little food they had. They wrote S.O.S. messages and looked out over the 6-10 feet of water that now covered their neighborhoods. Many of them – human and animal – perished waiting for a way out that could take them both.

In October of 2006, President Bush signed the Pets Evacuation and

Transportation Standards Act. The bill requires that state and local preparedness agencies across the country re-work their emergency plans to take into account pet owners, household pets and service animals. Agencies that fail to do so would not qualify for grants from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Over the past few months, state lawmakers have been working on Oregon's Animals in Disaster legislation (Senate Bill 570). The bill passed the Oregon Senate by a vote of 25-3, and passed the House of Representatives 53-5. Governor Kulongoski is expected to sign the measure, putting Oregon among a handful of states that have acted on the PETS bill. So far, the only states to include animals in their disaster plans are California, Florida, Hawaii, Illinois, Louisiana, Maine, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York and Vermont. Legislation is pending in Oregon, Arizona, Connecticut, Montana, Nevada and Texas. Oregon is one of the only states to include livestock in their plans, in addition to companion animals.

Johnni Prince, Greenhill's Executive Director thinks this bill is an important step for Oregonians. "It will ensure that they won't have to make a choice between staying with their pets and putting themselves in danger, or being rescued," says Prince. "Planning for both people and animals in emergency situations is the best way to keep all of us safe."

According to the American Veterinary Medical Association, there are more than 358 million pets in the United States, living in about 63% of American households. In Oregon, 67% of households have a pet. 61% of pet owners say they would refuse to evacuate if they couldn't take their animals with them.

With anywhere from 100 to 150 dogs, cats and small animals living at Greenhill each day, we have always thought an evacuation plan was an important part of our daily operations. Each staff member has been trained in how to safely remove animals from the shelter, and we have an outside meeting point for all staff and volunteers in case of an emergency. We encourage you to think about an evacuation plan for your family that includes the companion animals that share your home. If a disaster strikes, your pets will depend on you for their safety.

## Karma and Samba : On the Road to Health



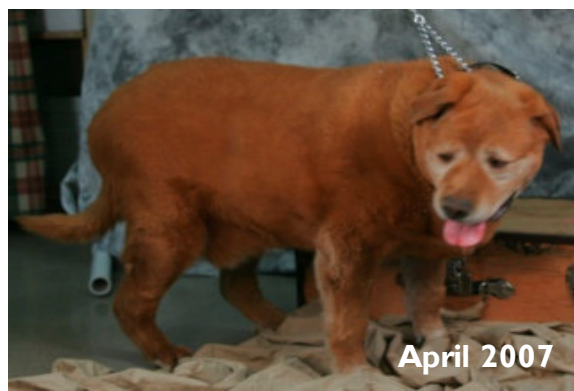
There were many volunteers that were part of the efforts to save Karma after he was rescued from an abandoned storage shed in Linn County with no food, water or bedding.

Karma moved in with Dr. Doreen Hock of Pacific Veterinary Services on January 1, 2007 for the first month after his rescue. He received excellent care from Dr. Hock while she was bringing him back to health, including a thick cushy pillow to lie on and the companionship of her other dogs. Dr. Hock re-named him Kitch, short for kitchen, because his favorite place was in the kitchen!

Kitch moved in with Cindy Ehlers of Pawsitive Pet, at the end of January and she began working on his behavioral training. One of the first things Cindy noticed about Kitch was his resiliency and mental stability. In spite of what he endured, he quickly adapted to new situations and didn't appear to be afraid of anything except being left alone.

Kitch loves people, other dogs, eating, lying on his cushy bed, and playing outdoors. He will happily entertain himself chewing on bones and lying outside on the grass on warm sunny days.

Kitch has now found his "forever home" where he can go to work with his new mom. His training will continue and Kitch's new mom hopes he will be a therapy dog one day.



Samba came to the shelter weighing 195 pounds, more than twice his recommended body weight. BJ and Denice Jones have fostered Samba since January. While in their care, he has lost a whopping 40 pounds and they have already had to take a link out of his collar! Samba is going on two walks a day, both an hour long. # Dogs Love a Benevolent Leader

Dogs need guidelines and boundaries just like kids. Good leadership will earn your dog's respect and help him to feel confident and secure.

**Control the Resources.** Just as parents control allowance, curfew and use of the car, you should control all the "good stuff" when it comes to your dog.

**Food:** An incredibly valuable resource. As such, it should come from you, not from that round thing that is always magically full! Feed once or twice daily, rather than leaving the food down all the time. For dogs with severe leadership issues, or to kick-start your program, hand-feed meals (a few pieces at a time) for two weeks. Have your dog sit or perform another behavior for each bit of food.

**Toys and games:** Leave your dog with a few toys, but reserve the really special ones for when you are present. Bring these special toys out periodically and play with them, with your dog. Now you are also the source of all the fun! Note: Playing games like tug-o-war are fine as long as your dog understands the rules of the game and doesn't get overly aroused when you play.

**Nothing in life is free!** This means that your dog must do something in order to earn things that are valuable to him. If your dog wants to go outside and play, he must sit and wait at the door until you release him, not rush past you almost knocking you over on the way out the door. Have your dog sit or perform another behavior before you give him meals, treats, walks, toss a ball, click his leash onto his



collar, and anything else he finds valuable. *Incorporate obedience exercises into everyday life.* Keep practice sessions short and frequent.

**Your vet will love you for it!** It is a good idea to inspect your dog regularly for cuts, bumps, ticks, fleas, etc. To make this easier for both you and your dog, teach your dog to accept handling and petting. Do daily massage sessions that include

handling your dog's paws, ears and mouth. My dogs particularly enjoy Ttouch massage:

## Handling Tips

- While training your dog to accept and enjoy handling, never force him to let you handle him, it will only damage your relationship and trust.
- Try it when your dog is calm and relaxed.
- Start massage in areas where your dog is already comfortable being touched.
- Work with your dog when he's hungry.
- Begin by dropping treats next to you on the floor and inviting your dog to come sit by you.

**Nobody likes a bully!** Good leaders are kind and patient. Use praise and rewards to let your dog know when he is doing the right thing. Use verbal reprimands sparingly and your dog will know you mean business when you do use them.

## Vet Advice from Gail Schroder, DVM

**NOTE:** The following are very short answers to complex questions, only intended to encourage you to talk in more detail to your regular veterinarian about these topics.

### The Food Recall

**If Fluffy was eating the recalled food, but is feeling fine now, do I need to take her to the vet?**

You should call your vet if your pet was eating the recalled food and has shown even slight symptoms of low energy, vomiting, diarrhea, reluctance to eat, or drinking more water than usual. These are the signs of kidney disease, which is the type of disease seen by some pets who have eaten the recalled food. Also, if your pet has any pre-existing kidney problems, you may want to have blood tests rechecked.

**I want to feed a safe diet to my pet. Wouldn't a homemade diet be safer than a purchased food?**

NO. Commercial foods are a complete and balanced diet for your pet. Homemade diets rarely are able to meet your pet's dietary needs unless you are following a strict recipe recommended by a veterinarian. Homemade diets can be expensive and time-consuming to prepare, and can cause health problems if poorly balanced and fed long-term.

**What is kidney disease?**

When the kidneys are not working well, the body loses its ability to control water and electrolyte balances and to remove waste products from the body. In many cases, kidney disease is treatable with fluid therapy and medications, allowing damaged kidneys to recover, either fully or partially. Kidney disease is often considered an "old age disease" of cats, or can be caused when animals ingest antifreeze or toxic substances. To test for kidney disease, your pet will need a physical examination, blood tests and urine tests.

## GREENHILL'S SPAY DAY A SUCCESS!

Greenhill Humane Society's 13th annual Spay Day was a huge success! More than 450 cats and almost 90 dogs were spayed and neutered!

For three days in March we opened a hotline for low-income Lane County residents who needed help altering their pets. Most of the surgeries were performed in Greenhill's state of the art spay/neuter suite.

Hundreds of calls came from cat owners who made appointments through Stray Cat Alliance, the Cottage Grove Humane Society and Feline Assistance Network. 75 percent of the cats who were part of Spay Day were female, and that means we have prevented more than 1,500 unwanted kittens from being born this year!

There were more than 100 calls on the canine side of things. Amazon Park Clinic, City Center Cat and Bird Clinic and Edgewood Animal Clinic helped by donating additional surgeries. About 15 percent of the dog surgeries were Pit Bull mixes, so we definitely made a dent in Lane County's Pit Bull overpopulation problem!

By doubling the funds dedicated to Spay Day this year, we were able to help all the people who called our hotline. No one who qualified was turned away from Spay Day 2007, and we know Spay Day 2008 will be even bigger!

## Greenhill Donates \$10,000 to Willamette Animal Guild for a Low-Cost Spay and Neuter Clinic



Greenhill Humane Society recognizes the importance of providing affordable spay/neuter services in our area in order to combat animal overpopulation. That's why Greenhill donated **\$10,000** to the Willamette Animal Guild toward the building of a full-time, low-cost spay/neuter clinic in the Eugene/Springfield area. The Willamette Animal Guild is a non-profit corporation with the specific goal of establishing a full-time, fixed-location, low-cost spay/neuter

clinic for low-income pet owners and feral cat caregivers in Lane County.

The WAG clinic will offer 6,000 spay and neuter surgeries per year to start, and with regular expansion could eventually be able to offer 20,000. These are the kind of numbers needed to make a difference in overpopulation.

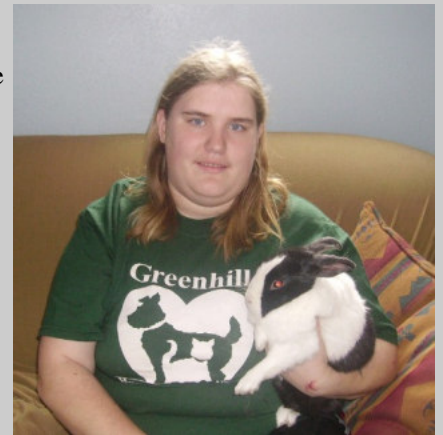

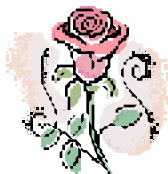
When Greenhill rescued 15 guinea pigs last October, she fostered four of the pigs and cared for the others at the shelter.
