Greenhill Humane Society Open every day 11 am - 6 pm If there's one thing we've learned these past few years, it's the importance of being resilient - of being able to respond quickly when there are challenges, being able to weather whatever comes, and coming out stronger in the end.

You've helped Greenhill be resilient in the face of the challenges that this community has faced - the wildfires, heat waves, cold waves, the pandemic, and the economic challenges that many are facing. You've helped by supporting Greenhill's infrastructure and expansion projects and by supporting the day-to-day care that we provide for this community's animals and people.

We have an exciting new phase in our shelter improvement project that I want to share with you. In the coming months we are hoping to make major improvements to our water supply systems and at the same time construct a storage building. It doesn't sound glamorous, but these projects will greatly improve our ability to meet future challenges.



The improvements to our water supply system will update the well that was first installed at Greenhill over 70 years ago. It will also allow us to maintain ten or more days of water on-site in the event that there is a major disaster that impacts our community's electrical infrastructure.

The construction of a storage building will enable us to improve our ability to receive and store shipments of pet food and supplies for the animals we care for as well as for people and pets who are struggling financially. This new storage building will be temperature controlled so that we can store large quantities of pet food throughout the year. It will allow us to meet the demand when a disaster strikes and a whole community is in need or in times like now, when we need to meet the constant call from individuals and families with pets who are struggling every day because of lack of housing, lack of employment, or just lack of funds.

We are very excited about these projects, and hope that you are able to join us in supporting them with a gift. I welcome any questions and invite you to come visit the shelter. Please reach out.

This issue's cover model is dazzling Sophie, who was rescued from a feral colony 12 years ago along with her brother Sidney. Sadly, Sophie passed on in June 2021 of liver failure, following her brother in January 2020. Their parents are so grateful to have had them in their lives for the short time they did.

Sophie was slightly cross eyed, had asthma, one less vertebrae in her back and a kinked tail making her, in her family's eyes, "absolutely perfect." Her family shared, "Sophie impacted our lives so greatly, as well as our other furry family members. She was a 'bossy mother' to us all. She has changed us, and left an indelible mark on our lives and hearts forever. When we lose a little loved one, we always say 'no more – we can't take the sorrow' but then, would we turn away a completely unadoptable being, knowing that we may be their only chance for food, shelter, and a lifetime of love? We all know the answer to that... so we take them in, love them completely, knowing that one day, they will break our hearts."

When it comes to feral cats, Sophie and Sidney's parents have learned that, although wild and unwilling to be handled at first, these wild children keep learning. Contrary to popular belief, a completely feral cat can learn to be physically touched and petted. They learn from watching other cats enjoy human love and continue to grow. In this picture, Baloo (left foreground) and Mowgli (burrowed into gray Cossack Hat) taught their wild kittens Sidney and Sophie (front right & rear) how to be petted and loved.

Sophie triumphed over many medical emergencies in her lifetime. When Sophie came home with orange pollen from lilies on her face her parents didn't realize

that lilies are extremely poisonous to cats. She was admitted to an emergency vet for 48 hours of IV fluids to flush her kidneys. She recovered, and after digging up all the lily plants in the yard, her parents wish to inform other

pet parents of the dangers of lilies. According to our Director of Shelter Medicine: Tiger lilies (lilium tigrinum), Easter liles (lilium longiflorum), Stargazer lilies (lilium orientalis stargazer), Oriental lilies (lilium orientalis), Day lilies (hemerocallis sp), and all hybrids of these can cause kidney failure in cats. All parts of the plant are extremely toxic to cats. Even ingestion of just the pollen from the plant or drinking the water from the vase can be deadly. Fast, aggressive treatment can be life-saving. But sadly, in many cases, by the time you realize your cat is sick from ingesting the plant, the damage to the kidneys is irreversible. If you suspect that your cat has ingested lilies, most veterinarians recommend immediate treatment before symptoms are evident.

Sophie came down with a condition called "Feline Hyperesthesia" that creates imaginary sensations in a cat's back and tail to the point where they sometimes begin aggressively and violently chasing their tails, attacking and injuring themselves, or can even have a seizure. Sophie, was able to overcome it with medication which helped her through attacks. Thankfully, she made a full recovery!



Gaining more perspective Providing quicker diagnostics for shelter animals

Sweet girl Yazie is one tough pup. In mid-December, she was hit by a car and then abandoned at the Emergency Vet Hospital. She was in shock and visibly in pain with a severe injury to her left hind leg. The Emergency Veterinary Hospital started her on pain medication and Springfield Animal Control transported her to us so that our veterinary team could continue her care. Although the leg injury was obvious, we needed to assess Yazie for additional injuries in order to know how to best treat her. Thankfully, we had our brand new x-ray equipment to take as many images of Yazie as we needed. The x-rays confirmed that she had a badly







fractured femur which could only be treated by amputating the leg. But, as Dr. Gail Schroder explained, "before an amputation can be done, we want to be sure her other three legs and pelvis are healthy and can withstand the extra weight. Any other injuries need to be addressed simultaneously or she'd be in a lot of pain after surgery." Luckily, x-rays of her other three legs, pelvis, and spine all looked good.

After surgery, some recovery time, and lots of cuddles with our team, this brave girl proved that having only three legs won't stop her! With resilience and time, she has gained strength, and confidence, and has adjusted swiftly to her new way of walking. On her first day on the adoption floor, she melted the heart of a young woman looking for a companion. She fell in love with this unique pup just like all of us.

Thanks to the help from generous donors, we were able to install the muchneeded x-ray equipment in our state-of-the-art medical hub to help more animals like Yazie. Before this, when an animal came into the shelter needing x-rays, they were transported to a local vet office, which incurred significant expenses and time for our medical team to coordinate, and increased stress and discomfort for the animal during transport. Now, we have the ability to examine and diagnose an injured animal immediately, and can easily provide follow-up x-rays to monitor their healing. This means more rapid and comprehensive care for the animals, as well as peace of mind for our veterinary team, knowing we are providing the best possible care.

Feeding it Forward Supporting our animal loving community

As we reflect on the last few years, we are reminded of the importance of not only supporting animals but the importance of keeping families and their pets together. Our year-round food pantry supports our community's most vulnerable members. Pets are often the first to go hungry when a family is facing financial problems, food insecurity, or lack of housing.

In 2020, between the pandemic and the local wildfires, we saw the increased need to dedicate more resources into our Community Pet Food Pantry and provided over 25 tons of pet food to those in need. Since then, the need to help provide supplies to those in need has not stopped. In 2021 we handed out another 25 tons of food. We project the need to provide pet food and supplies to families will continue to rise.

In addition to our on-site pet pantry, we have partnered with non-profits throughout Lane County to distribute food and supplies where it's needed most. We have also partnered with United Way of Lane County and the Ride United program. This is a program in collaboration with DoorDash where pet food can be delivered to those in need. This enables us to make sure that people without transportation can still utilize the food pantry.

If you or someone you know needs help providing food or pet supplies for your furry family member, we can help!

Youth's Impact on Animal Welfare Oregon's Kid Govenor leading the way

Through Greenhill's Humane Education program, our team visits schools teaching students how to be compassionate to animals. We are always amazed at the younger generations' desire to learn and help! And even though the pandemic put a pause on certain things like in-person learning, that did not stop some very special young people from making a difference in the lives of animals. Youths are recognizing that they can be the voice for animals and now that the world is opening up again, these young people can put their passion for helping animals to action.

One of the students making an impact in the animal welfare world is Oregon's Kid Governor, Emerie Martin. The Kid Governor program enables 5th graders around the state to run for office while representing a platform that is important to them. Emerie was elected by the students of Oregon based on her platform to stop animal abuse in Oregon. Her message is spreading and being heard by students and adults all around Oregon.

Part of Emerie's plan is to "Lend a PAW." The "P" stands for "Participate." This is a message to urge students to get involved in helping animals. Dedicating time to volunteer at a shelter, creating pet toys for shelter animals, or making posters of adoptable animals and hanging them in their community are all examples of ways young people can make a difference in the lives of animals in need. The "A" stands for "Acknowledge." This urges kids to be aware of animals who need help and to speak up for an animal who may be in danger. The "W" stands for "Welcome." Invite animals into your life by speaking with family and friends about the importance of adopting an animal and giving them a loving life.

Emerie also looks toward a future where any person who has been convicted of a crime against an animal cannot own a pet again. This is a law that has recently been passed in the state of Illinois. By disallowing animal abusers their right to have a pet in the home after an offense, more animals can be protected and the risk of animals continuously getting neglected can be erased.

Emerie is one of so many passionate young people who are giving a voice to animals. She is an incredible example of one young human making a giant impact on animal welfare. Her voice will inspire more young people to be compassionate to animals and give them the best life possible. We are so proud of all her hard work and dedication!
